

THROUGH MY MOST GRIEVOUS FAULT

It was just over a decade when the introduction of the New Roman Missal, with its many changes in some of the wording of the sacred liturgy, restored the previously known *Confiteor*, or "I Confess" the words "Through my fault, through my most grievous fault..." accompanied with the thrice

movement of beating our closed hand over our heart. The priest himself also does this when using the Roman Canon, Eucharistic Prayer I when he says, "though we are sinners". Admittedly, it seemed strange to do



this but now it feels so tied to the words themselves, confessing that we have sinned for no other reason other than by our own choosing and admission. I have long sensed as a priest confessor for three decades that Catholics in general have either lost a sense of sin or are not prepared to make a good and thorough confession of all their sins. We can't confess sin but then place the blame on someone else since we are actually convicting ourselves of that sin in the sacrament of Reconciliation. We admit, but also remind ourselves in the Confiteor, that our sin is our own fault. Growing up and fighting with my brother Mark over something (often nothing) I would sometimes remind either of my parents what Mark had done in defense of myself. Sometimes I was right and I had been provoked but often enough it was both of us. My mother would say, "When you die and go to heaven (prophetic? Hope so.) God isn't going to ask you what Mark did but what you did. That is our goal in saying the Confiteor, admitting our own guilt and fault and beating our breast in the physical and symbolic gesture of reminding our heart of its often-false desires and intentions.

I recall someone, at the time of the release of the new Roman Missal, saying that it doesn't seem fair that everyone should have to beat their breast and state "through my fault" as there were holy religious Sisters, monks and priests in monasteries and convents all over the world who live a life of prayer and certainly wouldn't fall under the category of "grievous fault". Yet the closer we come to Christ the more aware we are of our sin since we don't compare ourselves to others but to Christ himself. It is through Jesus that we see ourselves. And grievous? Yes, "since all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God". (Romans 3:23) That's <u>all</u>, not some, not the majority, but all. Standing in the presence of Jesus my sin is grievous and it grieves the heart of God. Yet our sin is not meant to define us any more than our faults or our sexuality would. We have been redeemed, saved by Christ from our sin making us repentant sinners. As we heard in the First Reading last Sunday from the Book of Wisdom, verse 23: "...you overlook people's sins, so that they may repent". What a loving God who hates sin but is willing to overlook it in us, though not fully, that we would come to hate our sin and with God's help, change the course of our lives to faithfully follow and trust in him.

At the Mass of the Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday, the *Exsultet* is sung and one of the phrases of this proclamation is found in the

words "O happy fault that earned so great, so glorious a Redeemer!" How could we hold that the disobedience and sin of Adam and Eve could somehow be happy — a happy fault, let alone earn us anything from God? It can only be seen as happy since it brought us the great and beautiful redemption from the Redeemer himself, Christ Jesus our Lord! Only in Christ can even our wretched sin bring us into closer union with him as the Sacrament of Reconciliation, where we confess our sins to God through the priest, brings us into an even deeper union with the Lord as he sends us on our way, forgiven and free.

The Confiteor each Sunday reminds us of our common need to go to confession and make a good confession at least once a year as it serves to review those sins we need to bring to the sacrament, naming them with the expectation of the great forgiveness only Jesus can give through the priest as we actually hear the words of absolution followed by words of commission from the priest, to "Go in peace, your sins are forgiven."

The world in which we live doesn't seem to be getting any better... but we should be striving to do so. Seeing ourselves as God sees us is not only important in the spiritual life but essential as we then realistically view ourselves as sinners working on the repentance part in order that we may more earnestly seek to be like Christ.

While I've often written and preached about the Sacrament of Reconciliation, I don't get the sense that Catholics, especially post-pandemic, have been stirred into availing themselves more of God's forgiveness in the sacrament of confession, and that's not a good thing at all.

Many of the saints of the Church, including Padre Pio, have referred to a time when the mercy of God will appear to every soul in the world simultaneously and reveal to each of us our sins according to the way God sees them. It has been called The Warning or the Illumination of Conscience in that God's great mercy will give to all of us something we don't deserve but so desperately need – a last chance to repent of our sins, confess them and follow Jesus. And while it seems many will be converted and come to believe through this warning, so many will not at all, choosing instead to live out their lives as they had previously been doing. It is said that so many people will search for and flock to any priest they can go to confession to and that the lineups will be so long that priests won't have time even to eat, they will be so swamped. I would say then, don't wait until the warning but do it now and live in a state of grace now. Avail yourself of one of the suitable Examination of Conscience sheets at the back of the church that is appropriate to your age and, in prayer, review the sins listed which are based on the Ten Commandments. Using an Examination of Conscience will greatly help you to identify by name sins you may have forgotten about or never confessed before. Making a good confession, grievous though our sins may be, will bring us God's peace.

I think often of my Grade One teacher, Sister Mary Jacquelin who taught our class that:

When God forgives your sins, he takes your sins and he throws them into the Sea of Forgetfulness and puts up a sign that reads, 'No Fishing'.
