

(Luke 4:16)



I don't really know the Bible as I should, yet I am surprised just how much I do know about it having grown up Catholic and going to Mass, the time in seminary training and

thirty-years of preaching and teaching as a priest. And over the years I have picked up on the patterns in the Word of God that repeatedly are conveying truths to us about this Catholic faith we are living. Take, for example, the text above from the Gospel of Luke. Jesus went to church! It reads that on the sabbath day (for Christians, Sunday) Jesus went to the synagogue... he went to church. Surely, if anyone could be exempt from the need to go to church it would be Jesus! Yet, he went and, Luke tells us, it was his usual custom, which is to say, he went every sabbath day (Sunday, for us!). I don't know about you, but I find that fascinating and intriguing since Jesus could have clearly shown that he was somehow above the requirement and practice of worship for he is God, the One who is to be worshipped, as all worship is reserved for God and God alone, for as no. 2097 of the Catechism states:

"The worship of the one God sets man free from turning in on himself, from the slavery of sin and the idolatry of the world."

So, again and again we hear (if we have eyes to see and ears to hear'), as Jesus so often said, of the necessity that all Catholics go to Mass every Sunday, without exception. why? Because we are the beneficiaries of the good things God will give to us if we are faithful to him and to his First Commandment,

"You shall have no other gods before me. You shall not make for yourself a graven image, or any likeness of anything that is in heaven above, or that is in the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth; you shall not bow down to them or serve them. It is written: "You shall worship the Lord your God and him only shall you serve." (Exodus 20:2-5)

Most explicit to our need, even our necessity to go to Mass each and every Sunday comes to us from the Third Commandment:

Remember the sabbath day, to keep it holy. Six days you shall labour, and do all your work; but the seventh day is a sabbath to the Lord your God; in it you shall not do any work.

The Church teaches that Mass on Sunday is an obligation for Catholics, which is to say, we don't have any other options. In fact, it's a response to a commandment of Jesus, not a suggestion or an ideal or something you will finally get around to doing when you have more time. We don't really have time for anything else when it comes to what we owe God, the Creator of all that is.... and the Creator of us all. It's rather amazing that

from the Apostles and the Church Fathers and popes, people would be naturally expected, once they had come to believe in the Lord Jesus, that they would participate in the regular worship of God at Sunday Mass. The sabbath was made for us by God himself.

The sabbath was made for man, not man for the sabbath; so the Son of Man is lord even of the sabbath.

Parishioners may remember when, during one of the Sunday homilies a month or two ago, I made a 'call and response' from the congregation in asking why we go to Mass? (although when preaching about our need to go to Mass to the Sunday congregation, I'm actually talking to the wrong people). It comes from the Preface of the Mass:

P: The Lord be with you. R. And with your spirit.

P: Lift up your hearts. R. We lift them up to the Lord.

P: Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. R. <u>It is right and just.</u> And there, once again, we have it. Why go to Mass? Because it is <u>right</u> and <u>just</u>. It is right because it is proper to acknowledge God in the use of time and space, on Sunday and in the church. It is right because everything we have, are and are called to be comes from God. And it is just, because, as God's creatures, it is what we owe God for our lives in justice – in giving to God what belongs to him – our worship.

So, then, why do the majority of Catholics, likely 70-80%, not go to Mass? Well, when I was a kid, I think it was over 50% of people went to Mass each Sunday. In the Archdiocese of Toronto, just in the last three years after we saw the unthinkable happen – the closing of our churches universally for the first time in the history of Church, and its own inevitable fallout which now sees that since the reopening of churches, attendance is down on average 30%. (And that's 30% of Catholics who were regularly going to church each Sunday but now, for various reasons, don't.) Given a culture like our own, where faith and a place to renew it weekly and celebrate it together in the worship of God is certainly taken for granted, it is little wonder that there would be a great falling-off of Catholics from the faith. Why worship at church on Sunday when you can watch it on TV while drinking coffee and sitting on the couch in your pyjamas or from your bed? No, it is right and just to give God what is his due - our worship, our praise and thanksgiving, our all!

And who is the beneficiary of our worship of God? Us. God is God and we are not God. The fact is, God does not need us. He doesn't need our worship, our thanks or our praise because he's God. But we need God and in that God-given need it naturally should lead us to seek him out, aside from the gentle breeze, or a lush, green forest or mountain scene, where he dwells - in the sanctuary, in his Word, his feeding of our lives and souls in the Eucharist. When we do that which God has designed us to do in our weekly worship of him with others, we experience the benefits of that which we give to God. As the old saying goes: "The only things you can keep are the things you give away." If we give God our worship we grow in faith and build up our relationship with him and one another. For God is outside of time and space but we are not. Therefore, we need a time and a space, the time being the Sunday Mass and the space being the church, our church. (FrC)

WHY A PRE-AUTHORIZED GIVING PLAN?

PAG allows St. Mary's parishioners to make their regular Sunday offering and if they wish their ShareLife offering using the "Direct Debit" system. PAG is an option, not a requirement!

When you participate in the pre-authorized giving, your offering is withdrawn from your account one a month on or about the 20th day of each month.

BENEFITS FOR YOU AND FOR ST. MARY'S

PAG is convenient. Your offering is deducted automatically. There is no need to search for your chequebook or stop by a bank machine on the way to Mass. PAG allows you to support St. Mary's when you are away – a benefit for the church since expense continue all year long. Most importantly, you are in control; you can increase or decrease the amount or withdraw fro the PAG plan simply by dropping a signed note in the collection basket or the parish office.

HOW DO I ENROLL IN PRE-AUTHORIZED GIVING

Decide the amount of your monthly offertory contribution, fill out the PAG authorization form, we have forms at each entrance to the church and in the parish office. Include a blank cheque marked "VOID" and place both in a sealed envelope. You can place the envelope into the collection basked or drop it into the parish office.

WILL I STILL USE ENVELOPES

If you still wish to use envelopes you can, there is a box on the front of the envelope that you can check it says "PAG Donation". You can also use the envelopes for any of the special collections not covered by your PAG. PAG only covers regular offertory, & Building & Maintenance.

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
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
