

The Story of Artaban: The Fourth Magi



The Wise Man Artaban, in his pursuit of the King of the Jews, misses his three friends, who set out before him: Balthazar, Gaspar, and Melchior. He misses the Christ Child, too, because his adventures lead him into strange encounters with dying beggars and frightened mothers, to whom he gives two of his three jewels saved for the Christ Child. He returns to Jerusalem after a fruitless search in Egypt. There, after thirty-three years he still diligently searches for the child.

This year it is Passover time. Artaban, now an old man, notes an unusual commotion, and he inquires about its cause. People answer him, "We are going to the place called Golgotha, just outside the walls of the city, to see two robbers and a man named Jesus of Nazareth hanged on a cross. The man Jesus call himself the Son of God, and Pilate has sent him to be crucified because he says that he is the King of the Jews."

Artaban knows instinctively that this is the King he has been searching for. So, he rushes toward the scene. But on his way he meets a young girl being sold into slavery. She sees his royal robes and falls at his feet pleading for him to rescue her. His heart is moved, and he gives away his last jewel for her ransom. Just then, darkness falls over the land, and the earth shakes, and great stones fall into the streets. One of them falls on Artaban, crushing his head.

As he lies dying in the arms of the girl he has just ransomed, he cries out weakly, "Three and thirty years I looked for thee, Lord, but I have never seen thy face nor ministered to thee!" But then a voice comes from heaven, strong and kind, and says, "Inasmuch as you did it to one of the least of my brothers and sisters, you did it to me." Artaban's face grows calm and peaceful. 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The Mysteries, The Message And St. Mary's Parish

Indigenous Reconciliation Fund Update

On December 12, 2023, the Archdiocese of Toronto announced the first phase of funding as part of our \$6 million commitment to the Indigenous Reconciliation Fund (IRF). Through the tremendous generosity of parishioners throughout the archdiocese, including our own parish, more than \$2.7 million has been directed through the IRF to organizations and projects committed to promoting healing and reconciliation for communities and families.

Recipients include: Aboriginal Legal Services located in Toronto, Ontario, that will receive \$538,000 to help fund their Indigenous family dispute resolution program called Giiwedin Anang. Embrace Life Council located in Igaluit, Nunavut, that will receive \$250,000 over five years. The funds will be used for grief care packages to assist those mourning the loss of a loved one by suicide. Indigenous Spirit Fund, a branch of Native Child and Family Services of Toronto, Ontario that will receive \$400,000 over four years to enrich their On the Land culture camp program curriculum. Keeseekoose First Nation located in Saskatchewan that will receive \$30,000 in support of their "Truth Telling Gathering" held earlier this year, supported also by the Archdiocese of Regina. The event was dedicated to honouring Indigenous cultures, fostering understanding and empowering communities. Native Peoples' Mission located in Toronto, Ontario that will receive \$150,000, over five years to expand programs and oureach of the mission. Ontario Native Women's Association, Thunder Bay, Ontario will receive \$475,000 over five years to enhance existing programming including activities related to healing and reconciliation for Indigenous women, culture and language revitalization, education and community building and spiritual and cultural

teachings with elders and knowledge keepers.

Teach For Canada – Gakinaamaage located in Toronto, Ontario that will receive \$450,000 over three years. The funds will be used for their initiative to invest in local educators in First Nations schools in remote locations, benefitting more than 4,300 students annually.

Wigwamen Terrace located in Toronto, Ontario that will receive \$475,000 over five years allowing the organization to hire additional support staff in order to provide their elderly residents with assistance with navigating technology, accessing mental health services and maintaining connections to Indigenous cultural and spiritual communities and resources.
