

IT'S NEVER TOO LATE.... UNTIL IT IS.

We are now entering the 5th Sunday of Lent which is past the midway point of this penitential season and next Sunday marks the beginning of Holy Week with Palm Sunday. Perhaps you may find yourself totally unprepared for Lent let alone Easter and you're saying to yourself, "I haven't done anything since Lent began". But I'm here to remind you that there's hope. It is never too late to renew your faith in a faith that <u>is</u> renewable. Lent is for the benefit of the people of the earth, not heaven, and there is still time to do the work Lent calls us to do within ourselves: to fast, to pray and to do works of charity.

Why is it not too late if Lent is the 40 days plus the Sundays? Because the call to conversion, repentance and addressing within ourselves those things that must be stripped of and which lead us from God, still count

whether it's Ash Wednesday or Palm Sunday. The scriptures always put a proper emphasis on 'today'. We don't have a tomorrow as it's always in the future and we cannot live there. We each have one day – today, our vantage point on our own lives before God if we are willing to take an honest look at ourselves, our habits, our sin, our selfishness, our weakness and our world. Let's face it, there are not a lot of institutions and people who are living well the life of a disciple. There is much company in the self-centered life and the lived sense that this world is all there is. And you've heard me say in some homilies that even many of those Catholics who profess belief in Christ live with one foot in the Church and one foot in the world.

The simple, straight-forward guidance of the readings of Ash Wednesday each year provide us with the right way to address with introspection the areas of our life that are in need of a spiritual overhaul by us, in cooperation with the Holy Spirit who convicts us of sin but also comforts us and bolsters us in the attempt to repentance. We cannot change that which we are not aware of and thus we need divine help to uncover within us that which God sees as our hinderance to living with Him in right relationship. The standard of comparison is not our neighbour but Christ Jesus Himself who is our model of holiness and our Teacher in the ways of faith. His commands are no longer written on stone tablets, as Jesus Himself said, but written on human hearts. The Saints and Martyrs of the Church are also great models for us as we look to their own struggles and victories over their own vices and sin.

FASTING



Fasting means to go without something – a meal, a luxury, something we are fond of in our tastes that induces some level of hardship in order that we might draw our attention to the fact that emptying ourselves of self interest and self desires

creates a space – for God to fill. and this is the point of "giving up" in order that we might be "filled up" with God!

However, Lent should never be reduced to merely material things or food but with what we are willing to take on. A decision to go out to another with whom we do or don't desire reconciliation or forgiveness or to someone who needs our forgiveness is far more important than bread or money because it pertains to relationships which are part of the great commandment of Jesus to "love one another".

ALMSGIVING



This is an admittedly strange word which only seems to appear in the scriptures referring to giving money to the needy. All of us know, however, just how many hands there are reaching out in legitimate need for that commodity of trade which allows things unattainable to the poor to

be purchased. Jesus told Simon that "the poor you will have with you always", which isn't in any way, shape or form to be construed as Our Lord's prediction that poverty among people will be a norm of life among humans. Rather, Jesus, knowing the human heart, knew that there is this part of us that wants to hold on to things, to covet and to not share our goods, our money, our 'stuff'. Babies come into the world with their little hands clutched together as if to suggest that through original sin we have a selfish desire to hold onto things rather than to let go of them. The decision to part with money which represents our labour is to recognize our own blessing and be a blessing to others. And yet, as in all things spiritual, we discover in our giving that we receive something far greater, the logic and blessing of which scripture tells us "It is better to give than to receive". (Acts. 20:35b) Yet when we leave this world, as appears evident in most deceased bodies placed in caskets, our hands aren't clutching but with fingers interlaced in one another, often with a symbol of prayer woven between them holding a rosary. We take nothing with us save those things we gave away to others.

PRAYER



There are literally hundreds of thousands if not millions of books that have been written on the subject of prayer but they are all meaningless if they don't convey and we don't understand the truth that <u>prayer is communing with God and allowing God to commune with us</u>. It is pure privilege and the great giving and gift of our God that He chose to communicate with us through

the prophets, through the scriptures, the Church and most especially through His Son, Jesus, who taught us to pray to His Father, allowing us to do what had been up until that time the unthinkable – to call God, *our Father!* Jesus told us to ask for anything in prayer, yet prayer should never be reduced in our relationship with divinity as just asking but of seeking truth, discerning and even questioning. To thank the Lord for all His many, many blessings and gifts in our being and our hope in living with Him forever!

Yes, it is never too late.... provided we respond to God now, today, in this moment, for that is all any of us have. "If today you hear God's voice, harden not your hearts." (Fr.C)

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


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
