

Several years ago, I wrote a bulletin article, of which I received many positive comments, but cannot seem to find the article. In the original I was discussing the stark and terrible human experience of loss in the face of death as we try to cope with the death of a parent, a spouse, a child or even the great sense of absence in the dying of a beloved dog. And while the passing of a pet is not comparable to a lost fellow human, it hurts and the pain and grief is real. How come to terms with such a sense of emptiness, grief, sorrow and a pain in the heart that won't go away as we stare in the face the overwhelming fact that they're 'gone'?



In every case of death there is that great chasm that cannot be crossed of which the finality and the tremendous sense of an un-crossable void remains. Our own left sense of being behind consumes us and the finality of it all makes the heart, the center of all our loves, torn open, raw and

infinitely sad. They were here, they were loved and loved us, they fill our minds with memories and the times we spent together in this world. Perhaps we watched them and accompanied them through great suffering or they left us too quickly, unexpectedly or tragically. No matter the circumstances, whatever the situations and whatever their age – infant, young or older – they're gone.

Our Catholic faith does not remove the finality in someone's leaving us for we know that as long as we live life in this world, we will not be with nor see that loved one again in our human existence. That finality is too much for some who get stuck in their grief and live their lives paralyzed by loss and grief. We often say we are grieving for someone who has died but in reality, we are grieving for ourselves. All grief is for the self and does not assist the one who is gone, though our prayers of hope-filled faith do help them. Our perspective is one of promises made, not by man but by God Himself that "those who live and believe in Me will never die". (Jn.11:26)

I often think about Jesus weeping over the death of Lazarus, his friend. Why did He weep when He knew what He was about to do for him – to raise Lazarus back to life and return him to Martha and Mary? Jesus was grieved at what sin had brought into the world and it particularly struck Him when someone so close to Him in an earthly sense – a friend – was dead. It wasn't that Lazarus was 'gone', (though he was and had already been dead for four days and had begun to decompose), but that Jesus felt through human experience the emptiness and sadness over those who die and leave us. There really are no words for this separation and finality, save to say that they're gone. The pangs of grief are overwhelming when the heart still loves but the object of that love is gone and is not to return as we knew them in our life time.

Personally, I've lost grandparents, my mother and father and so many friends over the years. I remember realizing when my mother died (just prior to the onset of covid) that I was now an orphan and that the parents who had always been there for me no longer were. They were gone. I've had several dogs over the years and anyone, who has had a dog and has received so much more than you could possibly ever give to the dog, knows that there is such a loss of an ever-present presence in that giving creature that is God spelled backward. Their empty dishes, their collar, their toys and their constant being with you is replaced by a silence and a sudden emptiness and quiet in the house that is most disturbing. They leave a big hole in your heart that is not easily healed and never really goes away as the years go by since they end up being buried in your heart.

Yet I can only imagine the horrendous pain felt in parents who lose a child either by sickness or accident or worse. I think of those parents and families whose child is abducted and they are left not knowing whether their child is still alive or not and where they are. The lament is great and the loss is heavy. As well, those who have lost a baby in the womb and no one knows but the mother and father and the great heavy sadness that follows. How much more does God, who sees the passing of His own at every moment, see what sin has brought into the world? To Him they are not, none of them, simply gone.

And so, the question: But gone where?

This is the question that crosses most people's minds in the face of human loss. Where are they? For those with no faith there is simply nothingness for those who have died. remembrances in their 'celebrations of life' insist that the deceased now lives only in our memories of them. So, what about those souls who are remembered no more when all those who knew them are themselves 'gone'? And for those of faith, blessed to know that the Author of life, who created them and called each soul into being, knew that the remedy out of eternal death and nothingness was the death of God in Jesus Christ as a ransom. Jesus paid the price with His own blood on the Calvary Cross which opened the bright promise of heaven and life without end in perfect, unearthly happiness which surpasses far beyond any of our wildest imaginings. We have this promise, this blank cheque with an amount of inestimable value that we ourselves are to sign our names to of our own free will. When we choose Christ, we are choosing everything! Even the most tragic death has the hope and promise of resurrection and life who is those things in His very essence and being. And He promises it to us, us being the world He loves and saves.

Perspective is everything. Archbishop Fulton J. Sheen said that "Death is a beautiful thing for him who dies before he dies, by dying daily to the temptations of the world, the flesh and the devil." How true that we don't just disappear and are gone, though it would seem thus. Death is but the door to life forever.

This earth and this life are beautiful and a gift from God but they're not our home. So, for those who believe in Christ and live with and for Him, at the conclusion of their lives on earth will in fact be 'gone' to those who knew them here on earth. That is, 'gone home'. (Fr. Charles)



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
