

THE MOST HOLY BODY & BLOOD OF CHRIST



Several years ago, following a funeral I had presided over, a person approached me to thank me for the homily I had given, but also to mention that they personally took offense to an announcement I had made just prior to Communion. Since funerals and weddings tend to bring together a mixed crowd of Catholics and non-Catholics, I usually make an announcement informing the congregation that Holy Communion in the Catholic Church is for those who are Catholic, though I was much more diplomatic and less blunt than that. I also added that those who are Catholic but do not regularly attend Mass and the sacrament of Reconciliation and are, therefore, not disposed to receive the Eucharist, are invited to come forward for a blessing instead of Communion. It was this last line that bothered this person who considered it as just another attempt by the Catholic Church to push people away. We spent a little time talking about this and I cited a passage from St. Paul that I think would be good for all of us to reflect on, particularly since many Catholics have not really been catechized in the beautiful and just teachings of Catholicism.

St. Paul, in speaking about how the Early Church was coming together to celebrate Eucharist, addressed an issue that is the foundation of the Church's teaching about reconciliation before Communion. In his teaching, St. Paul even goes so far as to suggest that because some people receive Communion but are in a state of sin, not having gone to the sacrament of God's forgiveness for some time, it is actually making them sick, even causing death!

He writes in 1 Corinthians 11:27-32;

"Therefore, whoever eats the bread or drinks the cup of the Lord unworthily will have to answer for the body and blood of the Lord. A person should examine themselves, and so eat the bread and drink the cup. For anyone who eats or drinks without discerning the body, eats and drinks judgement on themselves. That is why many among you are ill and infirm, and a considerable number are dying. If we discerned ourselves, we would not be under judgement; but since we are judged by the Lord, we are being disciplined so that we may not be condemned along with the world."

None of us at any time in our lives can really say "I'm worthy", even if we've just stepped out of the confessional with all our sins forgiven. It is Christ who makes us able to come forward, sinners that we are, and say "Amen" to the Body and Blood of Christ. The very last words we say just prior to the reception of Communion attests to our

unworthiness as we say, while the host is held aloft by the priest; "Lord, I am not worthy that you should enter under my roof, but only say the word and my soul shall be healed."

The sacrament of Reconciliation balances us out before God where we are able to say, "I'm not worthy of the Lord, but I am seeking to get rid of my sins and live a renewed life, realizing I need Christ's gift of his body and blood for my pilgrim journey to the Father's house". The two extremes that will lead us into sin or error is either thinking we are so unworthy of the Lord that we will never receive Communion because we are hopeless. And the other extreme would be to think that it really doesn't matter at all, as long as we desire to receive Communion.

In speaking with the person after the funeral, I mentioned that while it is a good and noble thing to desire to receive the Eucharist, we should also desire to stand before God forgiven just as much - we should desire to be forgiven as well as receiving the Lord in Communion.

Perhaps one of the difficulties in our day is the fact that we suffer the loss of a sense of sin. Daily news stories make us well aware of the really "bad guys" out there which can serve to make us feel like we're okay. The problem is that when it comes to sin, we need to compare ourselves with Christ not Karla Homolka or Paul Bernardo.

Have you ever tried to sit down and share a meal with someone you were really mad at or just couldn't stand? A meal is far more than just the task of consuming food; it is connected with others and is not possible unless there is unity, harmony and reconciliation. In order to truly commune with God, we need to be in communion with others, or at least are making serious attempts to do so. That's why we begin every celebration of the Eucharist with a penitential rite in order that we would recognize that we are not perfect people who have left the dirty world outside, but that we too are dirty and stained as compared to God, and come into his presence desirous of his forgiveness, mercy, love, compassion and power to forgive us.

Being freed of our sins by God is what allows us to continue to live in freedom to receive him in other ways, most especially in the mystery of the Eucharist. Existence in a constant state of sin, while continually receiving Eucharist, erodes the meaning and understanding of Eucharist away to the point that our sin would render the Eucharist ineffective for our lives and would, as St. Paul says, make us unhealthy. It could actually be the cause of our illnesses, depression, anxiety and unhappiness because of what it is - it is Jesus.

Celebrating the sacrament of Reconciliation (confession) is never easy for anyone as it is humiliating to admit before another human being that we are in fact a sinner and are guilty of various sins, however, deferred joys are always the sweetest. If we truly seek to be reconciled to God through the celebration of the forgiving sacrament which Christ himself initiated, we will then be able to "Taste and see that the Lord is good". (Fr.
